The Story of Barbara Wieneke

It's not every day that you get the pleasure of meeting someone who is 100 years old, so I wasn't quite sure what to expect as I walked into Barbara "Babs" Wieneke's home and stood by her bedside. I certainly did not expect to meet someone who had a story as unique and interesting as hers.

Born in 1921 in New Jersey,
Barbara grew up in Connecticut.
She fondly remembers ice skating on
the neighborhood pond (and scampering
through the scary woods to get there!) and
jumping into the back of the neighborhood coal truck to ride to
the top of a hill for sledding. She was even voted "Most Good
Looking" in her high school class.

Barbara lived in many interesting places over the years. She remembers being in Ann Arbor, MI when she heard the news that we were entering into World War II. She had recently married her husband John, a genius nuclear physicist who earned four engineering degrees by the time he was twenty.

Shortly after they were married, he was recruited by Robert Oppenheimer to work on a top-secret project out in the New

Mexico desert. Barbara, being a passionate and supportive wife, dutifully helped load their car with their most valuable possessions, including their new two-month-old daughter, Pat. Together, they drove west into the unknown.

The Manhattan Project was so new that housing for the scientists and their families was not yet completed, so the military made arrangements for the Wienekes to stay at a dude ranch in the nearby Nambe Valley. As they drove up the winding roads to their temporary new home, the unique smell of the piñon wood smoke rising from people's fireplaces filled the air.

Barbara loved life in New Mexico. The slower pace of life complimented her transition into new wife and mother. There was another couple with a daughter who was about the same age as Pat, and they and all of the other residents got along very well.

Eventually, the government finished building family housing at Los Alamos, so the Wienekes moved into their new apartment. The government did not allow personal furniture or home ownership, but Barbara was very happy with their spacious 3-bedroom unit located on the edge of a canyon.

Soon, Pat started to attend school. Barbara would run to the back bedroom of their apartment to wave goodbye as the bus carried Pat away for the day. Barbara started working, first managing the schedules of the local women who would work as housekeepers for the military families, then later starting a clothing company with her friend.

Barbara and her family lived in Los Alamos for a total of 9 years. After that, they decided that they wanted to have their own house, so they purchased some land halfway between Los Alamos and Santa Fe and built their own home out of adobe. Pat helped to build the walls, and their son Jeffrey helped out on the roof. Money was very tight because building supplies were expensive and difficult to come by in such a remote location.

After living in their adobe house for a number of years, they relocated to Los Angeles, California

where John started a new job at Hughes Aircraft (the same company that built the famous Spruce Goose aircraft, now housed in the Evergreen Museum in McMinnville, Oregon). I'm sure Barbara has many more anecdotes to share about this time in her life, and of all her adventures between Los Angeles and the time when she moved up to Brookings, but those stories will have to be shared another day!


